A SENSATIONAL FIND

One of our Swedish members, just retired and moving back up to the Northern Woods, donated his impressive stereo tape collection to the DEMS, saying "building up a collection and guarding it against all and everyone is a very very dead collection." Hoping to make our Society to be able to expand its efforts, such as producing more LPs, etc., he now wishes the contents of his collections to be available to all members against a reasonable donation per tape (or cassette, if preferred) to the DEMS.

There are mono recordings too, and going through the material we made a rather sensational find, some hitherto unknown amateur recordings from Duke concerts in Moscow. The way these cassettes ones miraculously slipped through the Iron Curtain is a secret by our donator, who wishes to be anonymous. Another explanation why these recordings haven't been told about before, is perhaps the sound fidelity, which, we think, is about the worst we have ever experienced. Thus more of an academic interest, these recordings nevertheless constitute an unique document, the only one we know of outside Russia, from Duke's Soviet Union tour in October 1971.

We expect listings to be completed during December for shipment to those interested in getting a free copy (mailing costs only). Please make your reservation as soon as possible.

Long at last we now have "The Girls" released. It was originally presented at the Monterey Jazz Festival in September 1961 as a four part work: "Sarah" (Vaughan)/"Lena" (Horne)/"Mahalia" (Jackson)/"Dinah" (Washington). When later re-recorded two beautiful things were more than doubled - but what became of "Sarah", not mentioned as a part here?

The Columbia version of "The Perfume Suite" is partly different from what we earlier have been able to listen to on RCA/Victor and broadcasts. Added enjoyment comes from the stereo sounds. "Sylvia" however being a "re-channelled" version, for unknown reasons. Why the original 9Sep57 recording of "Strange Feeling" (ax 59487-1) was rejected and a rerecording had to be made in 1961 is a little bit of a mystery to us, since the original is quite good - we can assure you.

Let's enjoy meeting the girls, with, or without, perfumes. Note: Liner notes indicate "The Girls Suite" to have been recorded on 19-20 August, 1961. This is false. Correct dates should read as given above.

Same as D.E.T.S. 5.

● Phontastic MOST-7632 "DUKE ELLINGTON TREASURY SERIES - 19 May 1955"

Same as D.E.T.S. 6. Though the year on the cover is stated as 1955, it should of course read as 1945.

● Phontastic MOST-7633 "DUKE ELLINGTON TREASURY SERIES - 26 May 1945"

Same as D.E.T.S. 7.

● Phontastic MOST-7634 "DUKE ELLINGTON TREASURY SERIES - 2 June 1945"

Same as D.E.T.S. 8.

● Piccadilly PIC-3524 "CLASSIC ELLINGTON"

"No discographical info is given. Listening indicates that it was recorded stereophonically. Duke announces. In one announcement he makes reference to an earlier release of his "Ellington Indigos" LP. An educated guess as to its source (referring to Bull 181/4, p.3, for the listing of titles for the Koala AW-14117 LP) the titles are the same except in a different order." (Carmack)

What a tremendous collection! The "Untitled Blues" occurred in error instead of "Oscalypso" on a 78 rpm M-1952 pressing. We believe "Blues" and "Body And Soul" to have been recorded sometime in November rather than July. "It Don't Mean A Thing" has earlier been issued in an edited version, only c. 5 mins., on Pickwick, but here now

● I possess an LP, Europa EJ-1010 which seems to contain portions from different concerts. What is the DE source? (Rjurok)

DEMS comment: This USA release is the same as the original Italian I GIGANTI DEL JAZZ GJ-12. For additional info see Bull82/1, Page M2, and also 81/4, p.5 and 81/5, p.5.

● SPOKANE 17 "BING CROSBY AT KRAFT MUSIC HALL" (see Bull80/3, p.2): This LP not only contains "Frankie And Johnny", pts. 1 and 2 (same as on RCA Integrale) but also the unreleased "Stomp Caprice". This last tune, not mentioned in your information, is a duo, Duke/Blanton, so superb that it is absolutely necessary to have this LP for all those who like the music of Duke. (Cumps)

● "BROWN BETTY" (see Bull82/4, p.1): The Swing Treasury 109 lp is mentioned in Bull80/3, p.5. (Hoefmit)

● The personnel given on the sleeve of "The World Of Duke Ellington Vol 2" and on UTD2004 for "I LOVE MY LOVIN' LOVER" is clearly wrong as Quentin Jackson is prominent in the last chorus. I can hear only one trumpet on this item and suspect that the brass is CA and QJ; certainly Cat is the trumpet soloist. (E Lambert)

● The unidentified title on Koala AW-14157 (as "Such Sweet Thunder" (see Bull81/4, p.3), and on Unique Jazz 27 (see Bull80/4, p.2, and 81/2, p.4) and mentioned in DESOR as 773g, I have found to be the same as "Big Bash", after having it compared to DESOR 786b ("Rehearsal for Paris Blues", 1 May, 1961). (Hoefmit)

● SNADER TELESCRIPTIIONS (see previous Bulletins): My friend Joe Showler discovered in the March 12, 1952 issue of Variety what seems to nail down the exact date of the Snader sessions, assuming that Snader did not depart from the date he had scheduled: March 14. (Hausmann)

Ed Hausmann and Klaus Stratemann has together continued to investigate in the various releases using the Snader material. Thanks to their efforts we are able to present the below table:

● On a recent sales list I was surprised to see an album on CHARLIE PARKER PLP-827 by Ray Mance, entitled "A Flower Is A Lovesome Thing". This turns out to be the familiar WYNE 107 and SIRAND 1050 by Cat Anderson and the Ellington All Stars, entitled "Ellingtonia". However, I also have this album on LA BREA L-8026 by Cat Anderson and the Ellington All Stars, entitled "In The Elegant Ellington Manner". Both the LA BREA and CHARLIE PARKER pressings are quite rare. (I Jacobs)

● Concerning Bull82/4, p.5, item i) and j): Are you sure? (Hoefmit)
 DEMS comment: Yes, we are.

● Concerning Bull84/4, p.5, item k): There is a typing error. The correct date should read 7Jun38 (not 7Jan38). (Hoefmit)

● CBS 88000: There are two takes, A and B, of "Lazy Rhapsody" included. Take A as first issued on Brunswick, take B on Columbia. I have compared Odeon 279.797, having B11205A in the wax; Odeon 7MOE2014; Philips B-07364-L; and

Gaps O40 (take A mentioned on the cover): All these are identical to the first version as on CBS 88000. Columbia CXL-27, CL-2046 (said to be the same as CBS 62778) are identical to the second version on CBS 88000. (Noefmit)

Concerning Bull 82/4, p.5, item t): Many years ago I received a long letter from Frank Dutton on the "Portrait Of The Lion" (WV 1006) subject. He pointed out that the confusion of take numbers was the result of some European 78 rpm release shows stamper numbers in the wax which many people have mistaken for take numbers. The conclusion was that Parlophone DP-288 was -1, Columbia CXL-27 -2. (-2 is the "lots of Rex" take). (E Lambert)

When are we going to get an LP album of the FENTAPES? DE: Way Back Blues, Where's The Music, Rubber Bottom, Play The Blues And Go; CLARK TERRY: Caravan, Basin Street,

Candy, Taking A Chance On Love, Something Borrowed And Blue, Daylight Express. (I Jacobs)

DEMS comment: There is in fact an LP, ENIGMA 1052, entitled "JOHNNY HODGES AT A DANCE, IN A STUDIO, ON RADIO, WITH JOHN COLTRANE, DUKE ELLINGTON, BAKER, BROWN, CARNEY, GONZALVEZ, HAMILTON" which contains the Duke Pentape selections, though the titles are changed as follows: Back Where?, In The Stands, Brass Top, Go Blues Go. (Mentioned in Bull 79/4, p.3, and 79/5, p.3).

UP-TO-DATE 2004: The "B Sharp Boston" version included gives me the impression that this take is actually the alternate take as used for the CBS(F) 62993 and for CSP P-13292. Is that true? (Cumps)

DEMS comment: We don't have the CSP lp at hand, but here are the various releases we know of:

DEMS: Two takes were recorded. Only take 1 has been used, despite what is said on RCA PM-43687.

MAORI (foxtrot/one-step/rumba), matrix nos. E32210, 32211, and 32448, recorded 21Feb30 and 20Mar30. Bakker disco shows E32210-A, E32211-A, & E32211-B as all being unissued; E32210-B & E32448-A are shown as issued on MCA 510101 (a.o.); E32448-A & E32448-B are both shown as issued on Brunswick 4776 (diff. versions?), there being no microgroove issue of E32448-B. Rust disco shows E-32210-A1B, and E-32211-A1B as having been recorded by but rejected by Brunswick. Both E-32448-A1B are shown as unissued, but Brunswick 4776 is shown only for take B - not take A as is the case in the Bakker discography. Timmer disco also shows E32210-A1B and E32211-A1B as being unissued; E32448-A1B are both shown issued on the Brunswick label (no numbers given). The MCA 510101 album liner notes indicate that this LP includes E32448-A (agrees with Bakker) and E32448-B (disagrees with Bakker).

DEMS: Nothing has been used from the 21Feb30 session, although the Brunswick 6812 shows mx 32210 on the label, the wax has E32448A(1). This same take is used for all releases except for Brunswick 4776 which used take B, included on the MCA LP together with the A-take. The B-take is possibly also used for the Raretone R-23000 LP release.
